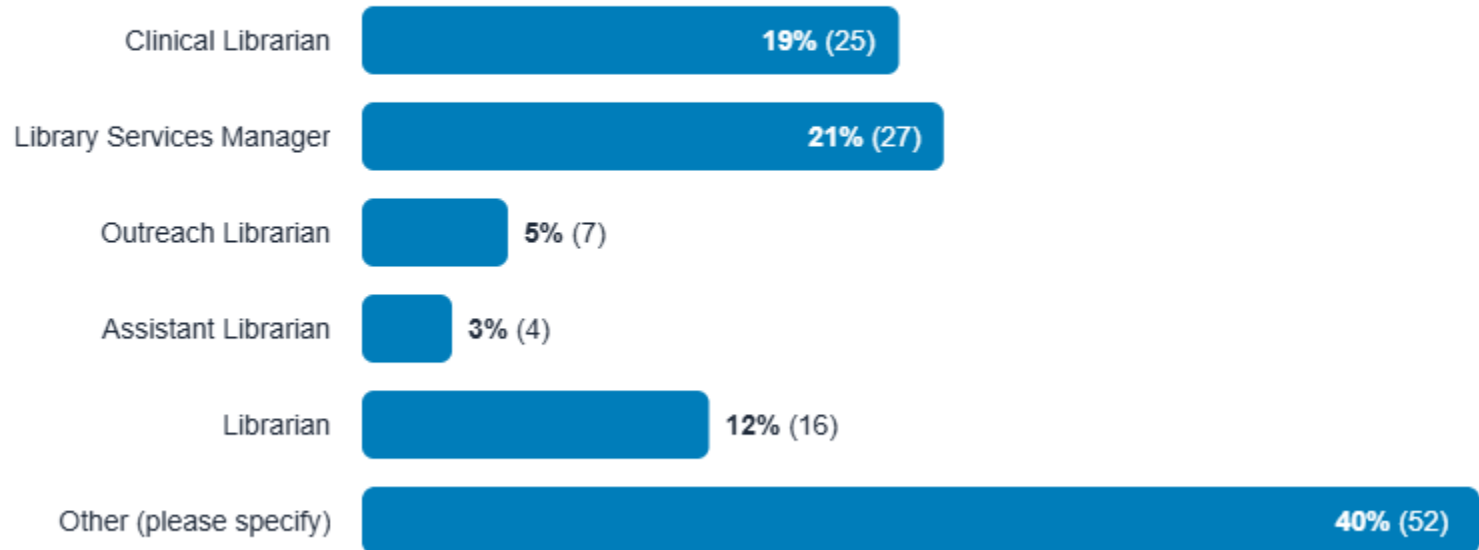

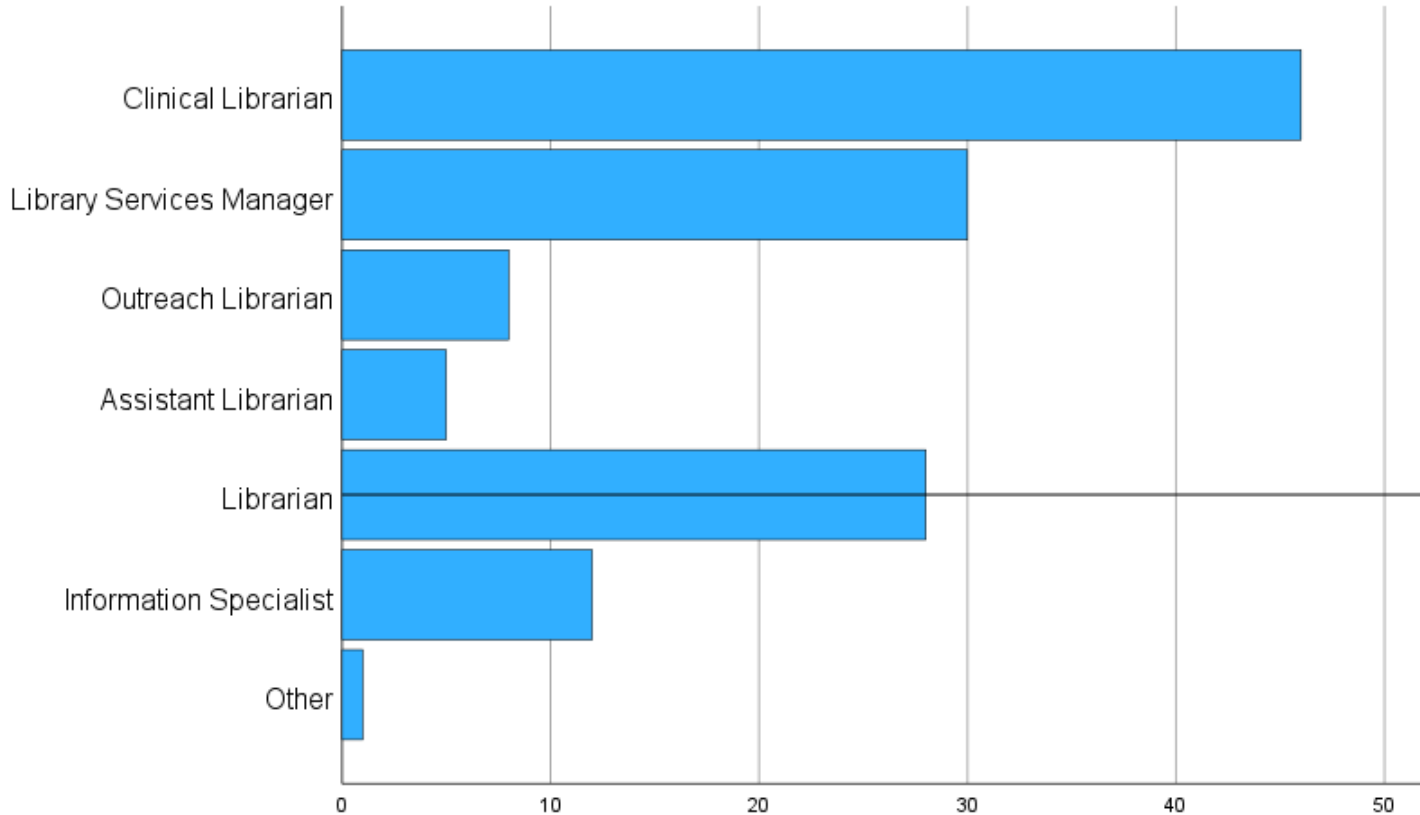

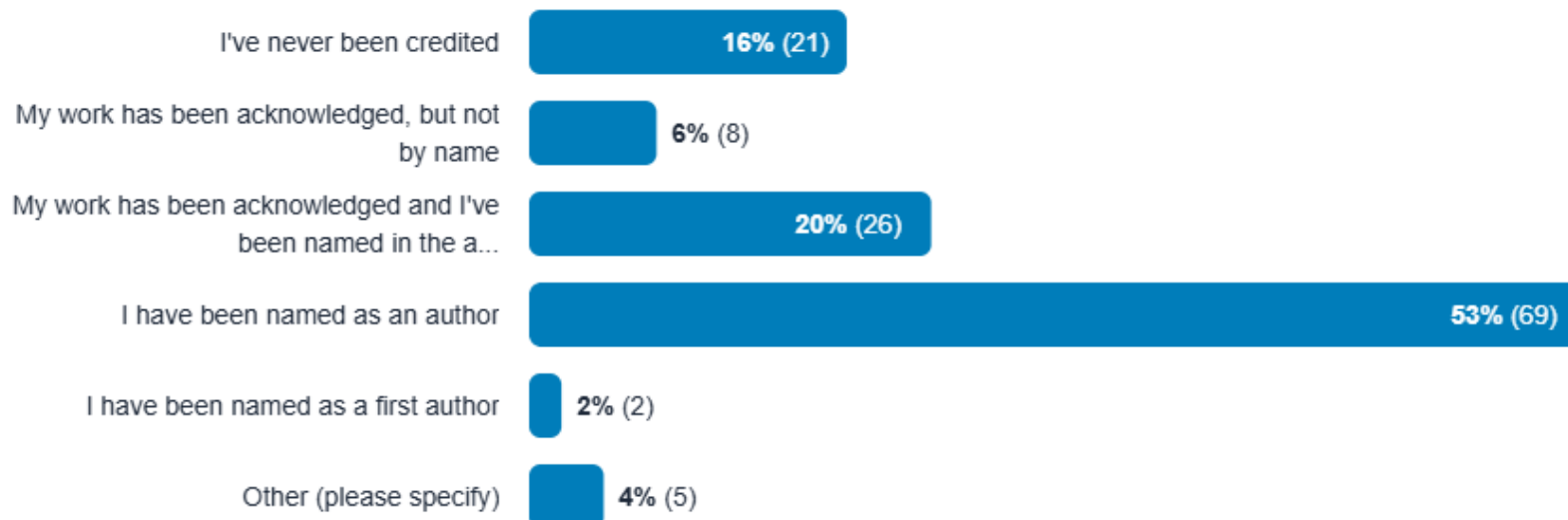

17. What is the highest level of contribution you've been credited with on a systematic review?

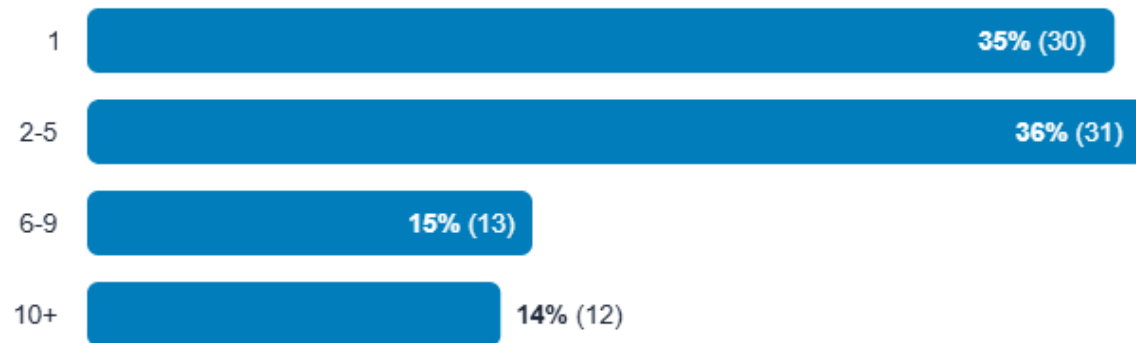

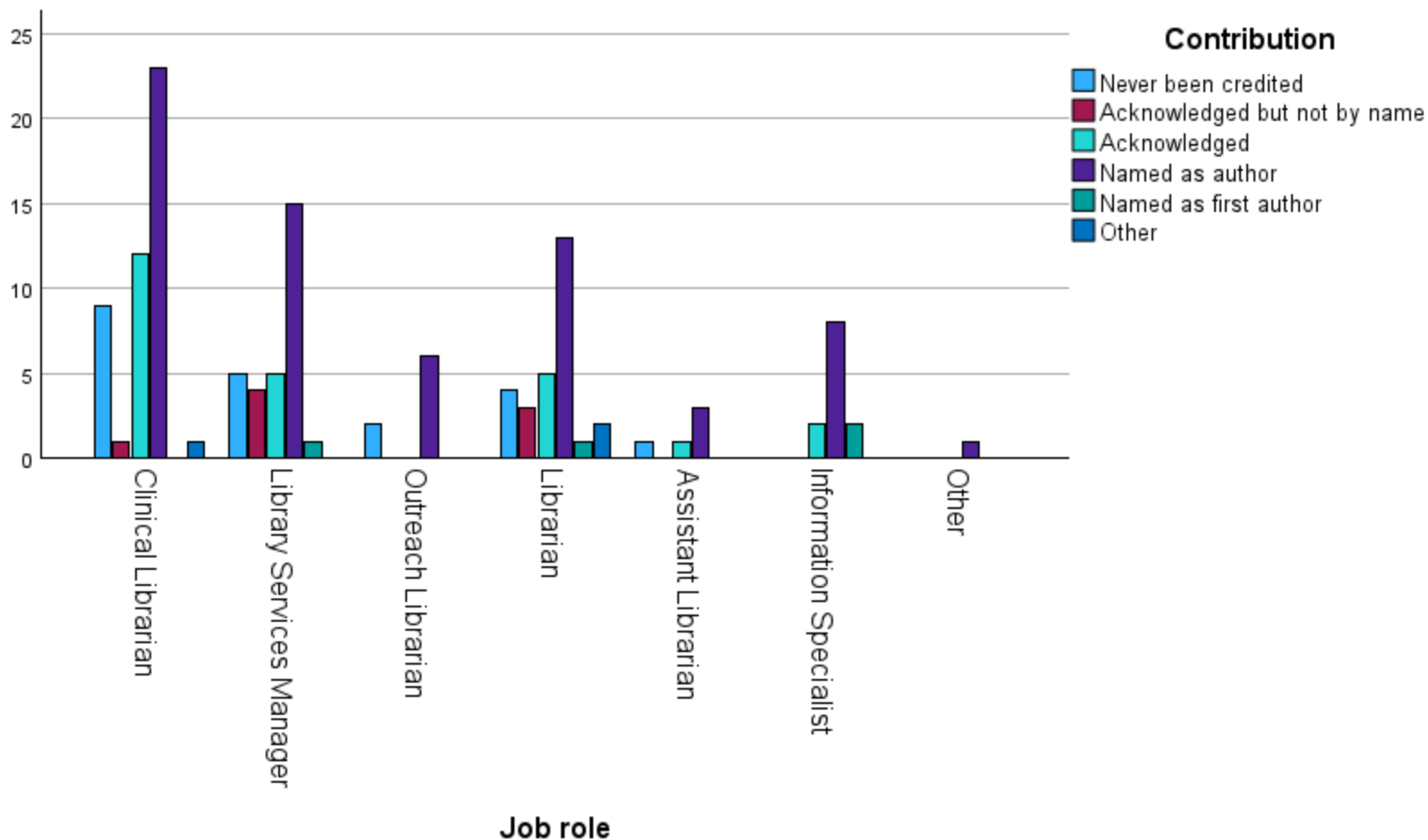

16. If you have been named as an author on a systematic review, how many times has this happened?

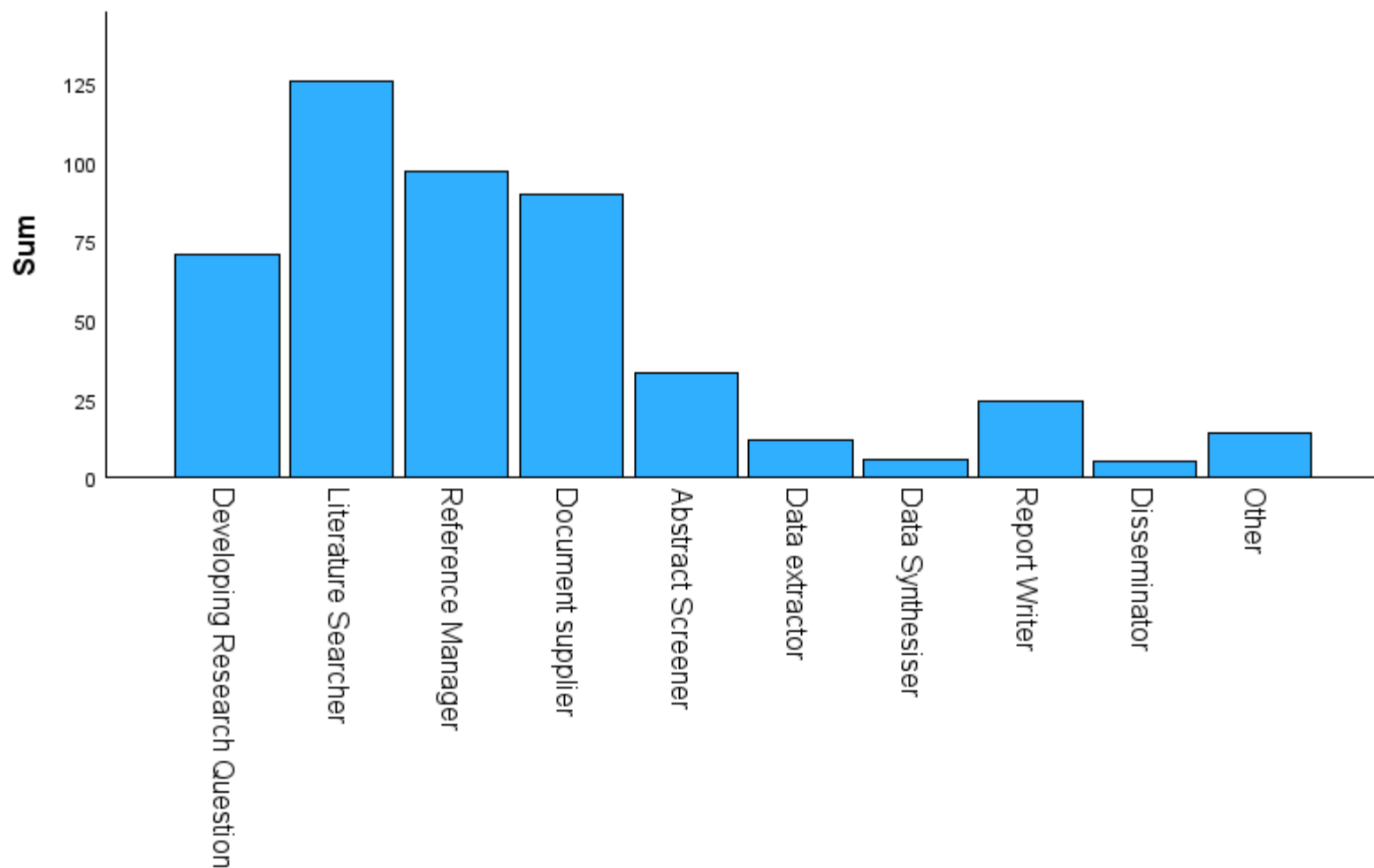

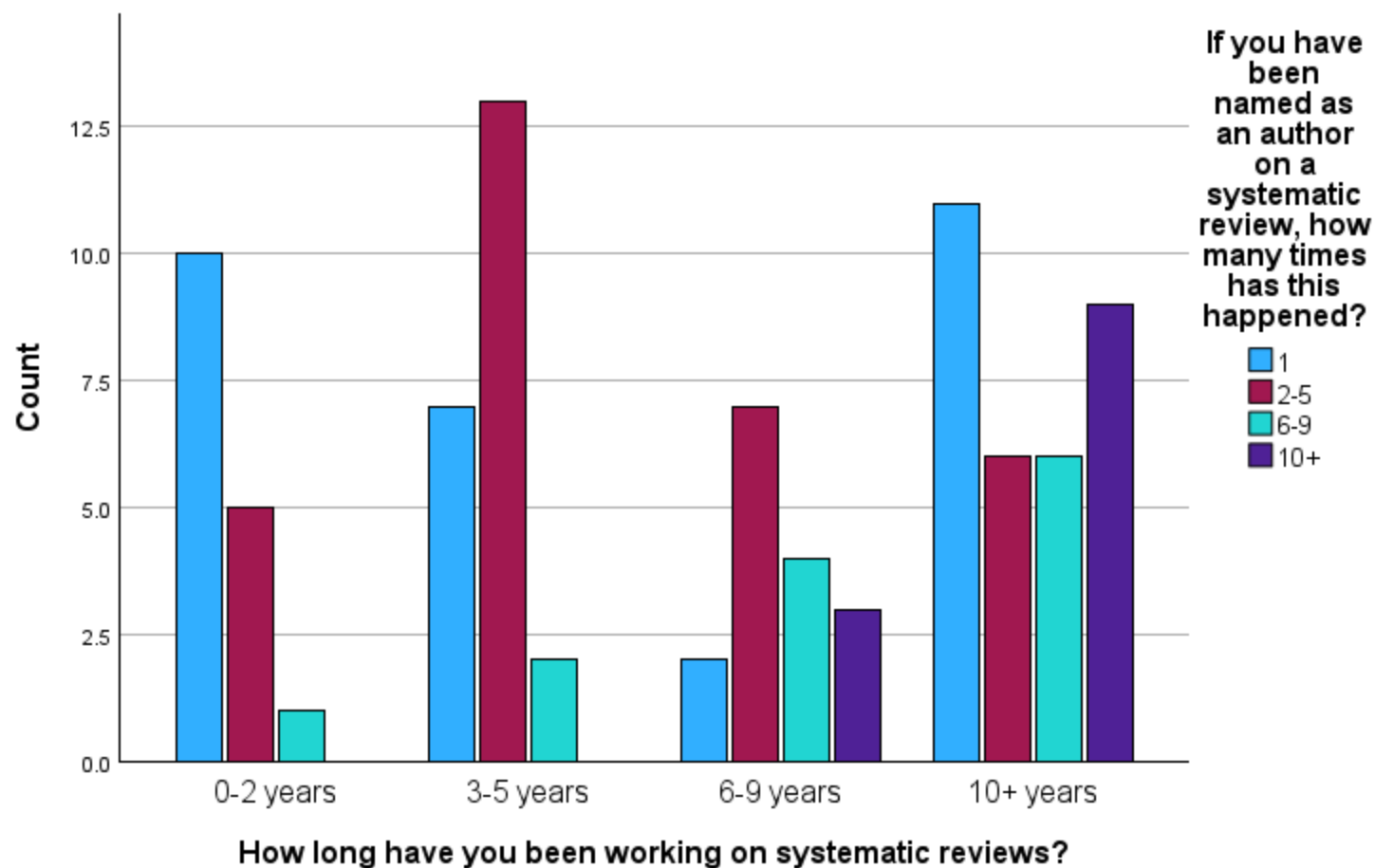
Contribution by job role

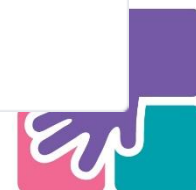
13. Have you ever worked with a librarian on a systematic review?

14. Thinking of your most recent systematic review, did you work with a librarian or information specialist?

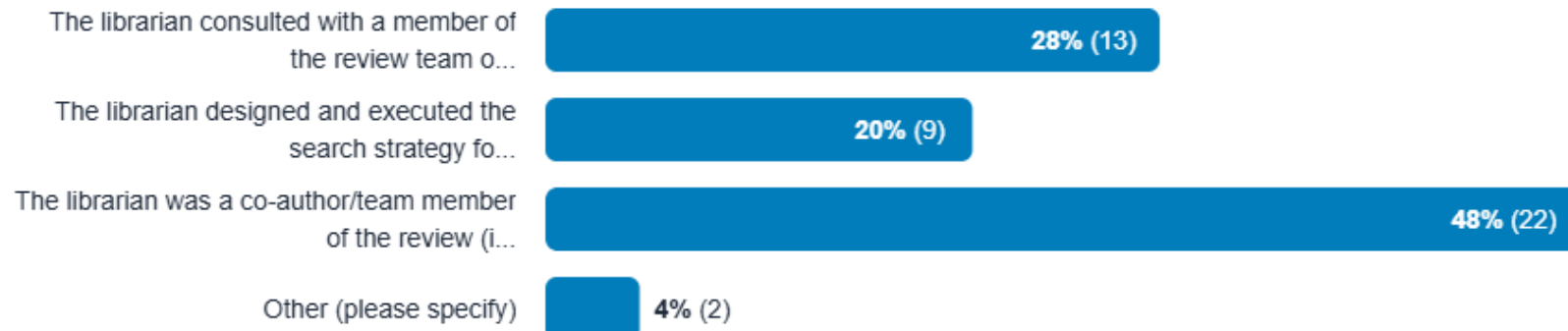
